①Ono Shrine

The Main Hall of Ono no Takamura Shrine is a designated Important Cultural Property of Japan that was built during the Muromachi period [1336-1573]. The stone pagoda within the temple grounds dates back to the Nanbokucho period [1336-1392], and is said to be a memorial to poet Ono no Komachi. There are also two round burial mounds within the temple grounds which belong to the Ono Burial Mounds.

②Iwagami Burial Mounds

The Iwagami Burial Mounds consists of four round burial mounds including some which possess dome shaped stone burial chambers, etc. A stone coffin from the burial grounds is preserved at Iwagami Shrine.

③Ono Tofu Shrine (Subsidiary shrine within the grounds of Ono Shrine)

Ono Tofu Shrine's main sanctuary is a designated Important Cultural Property of Japan that was constructed during the Muromachi period [1336-1573]. The Tofu Burial Mounds within the shrine grounds consist of one keyhole-shaped burial mound and one ancient round burial mound

④Ishigama Burial Mounds (within golf course)

The Ishigama Burial Grounds contain 14 round burial mounds and horizontal stone chambers.

⑤You Burial Mounds (within golf course)

The You Burial Mounds contain 3 round burial mounds and horizontal stone chambers.

⑥Mt. Mandara Burial Mounds

The Mt. Mandara Burial Mounds contain about 120 round burial mounds and horizontal stone chambers.

⑦Wani Otsukayama Burial Mounds

The Wani Otsukayama Burial Mound is a 72-meter-long keyhole-shaped burial mound. In 1907, a wide variety of grave goods such as mirrors, magatama (comma-shaped beads from prehistoric Japan), necklaces, copper arrowheads, and more were excavated from the mound.

⑧Zeniwara Burial Mound

The Zeniwarra Burial Mound is a round burial mound with a horizontal stone chamber.

⑨Karausuyama Burial Mound

The Karausuyama Burial Mound is said to be the grave of government official Ono no Imoko. It is a square burial mound with a yokoguchi (horizontal) style stone burial chamber.

⑩Tenno Shrine

Tenno Shrine's main sanctuary is a designated Important Cultural Property of Japan, and was constructed during the Muromachi period [1336–1573].

⑪Enoki no Ichirizuka Remains

An enoki tree (Japanese hackberry) was planted here along the Hokkoku Kaido Road (Nishi Omi Road) as a milestone for travelers of the time.
